Dear Friends,

Another of the "Four Sisters" has fallen.

No, it's not a person or a beloved landmark. No, this is the second sister to fall is merely a huge, leafless old tree in the wetland replacement area along Route 86 between Findley Lake and North East.

Pennsylvania was required to create the area because construction of the highway – at least 30 years ago-- did, indeed, take away some wetlands. It was a thing at the time. Not sure whether it's still a thing or not.

Anyhow, the replacement area on the north side of the road is an enormous pond created surrounding four old trees. I have no idea what kind they are. Being flooded, they've not shown leaves for decades. Flooded trees not meant to stand in water always die. It may take decades, but they always succumb.

These four always provide a bright spot, even for a drive-by instant. They turned into sun-bleached sculpture some years ago. They were often decorated with marsh birds, a little flock of pigeons or, often, a bald eagle.

Ever so slowly, ever so gradually and invisibly, changes were taking place. Two remain.

In some weird way, it reminds me a bit of Lent – the season when we are to return to God. I'm not saying 40 days and 40 nights with dry feet every year would save the Four Sisters.

But 40 days and 40 nights of extra prayer, extra Bible reading and/or trying a new spiritual practice would go a long way toward bolstering anyone's faith. (Just watch out for eagles in your hair.)

I'll enjoy the last two sisters while they last, thanking God for the beauty of creation, and for the blessings of experiencing Lent yet again.

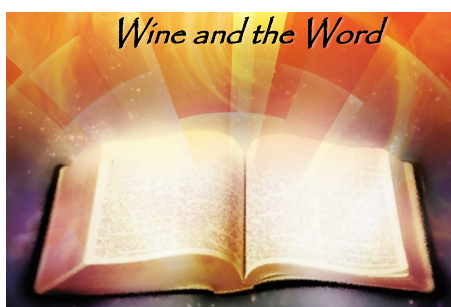
Attention Families:

Lenten Read Together

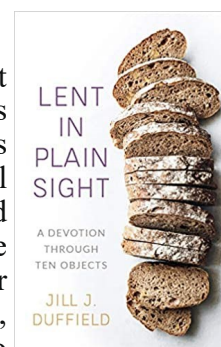

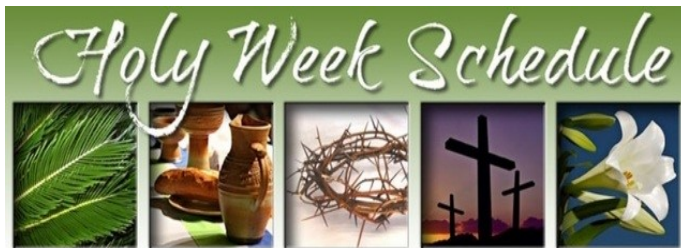

News from Session

January Session notes:

PNC COMMITTEE: It was approved to offer a base salary package of a little over half of the presbytery minimum for any candidates who will be interested in our pastor's position.

A couple of issues to consider: coordinating time for Sunday morning services, and when to have a small get-to-together with Emmanuel Church. February 12 was suggested but was decided to be too soon because of the pandemic.

It was discussed that a better way to reach out was to start having church activities on Zoom (like Wine & Word; Bible study; etc.).

STEWARDSHIP/FINANCE: A big Thank you was given to Bob Kellerman for working on updating and negotiating a new insurance policy with Erie Insurance saving us \$4,297, Motion carried. He also explained the details of the \$1,000 tech grant given to us by the Synod. After the annual meeting, the committee will be looking into changing some of the investments within the PNC account.

WORSHIP/ MEDIA MINISTRY: On a motion from the committee, a proposed list of communion dates was presented and approved. They are still looking for a social media person to update Facebook. The new camera and equipment has been much more flexible and the crew is happy with it.

MEMBERSHIP CARE & DEVELOPMENT: Still no committee chairman as of yet but a 190 year anniversary committee was formed to start working on planning the celebration. Thanks to Sue K, Dave M, Barb G, Bob K, and ME for volunteering to start planning this event.

MISSION & OUTREACH: The Christmas Joy total for 2021 was \$729. Thank you!

Since this was 2021's monies, the committee sent this to the Presbytery Disaster Relief fund earmarked for the Mayfield Presbyterian church that lost their church in the storms.

The 2022 operating Preschool budget was received and acknowledged.

NEW BUSINESS: Session discussed what we could do for the Taylor family's tragic fire. We agreed that \$500 in gift cards along with prayers and donations from individuals would be collected after services and forwarded to them.

Congregational Meeting Minutes, January 30, 2022

Corporate officers for 2022 were elected: President Scott Shunk, Vice President David Maille, Secretary Mary Ellen Flowers, and Treasurer Barbara Griffith.

Nominating and Training Committee, being in need of two members from the congregation at large, gave a short report. Gil Long and Isabel Lyon volunteered and were elected. (Thank you!)

Bob Kellerman explained some details re the proposed 2022 budget (pp. 38-41 in the annual report). Gil Long moved to approve it, seconded by Brian Griffith. Motion carried.

We needed chairpersons for two committees, Membership Care, and Development, and Nominating and Training. After Mary Ellen Flowers explained the duties of the Membership Care, and Development committee, Marlene Long and Joanne Scott stepped forward; they will co-chair. (Thank you, ladies!)

Mary Ellen also explained the Nominating and Training duties. So far, we still have no chairperson for this committee.

Next, the Pastor Nominating Committee spoke and took questions from the congregation. They stressed that everyone should feel free to contact any member of the committee anytime there is a question or concern.

DONATE TO YOUR CHURCH **AND STILL GET A TAX BREAK**

For those of us over 70 1/2 years of age and have an IRA or 401K retirement account(s), as you know we are required to take a withdrawal(s) from the account(s) each year. This withdrawal, called a Required Minimum Distribution, (RMD), becomes taxable income.

Did you know that you can transfer any amount of money, up to \$100,000, directly from your IRA or 401K account(s) to charity each year? Well, the answer is YES, you can!

This transfer is called a **Qualified Charitable Distribution**, (QCD), which counts towards your RMD, but unlike an RMD, a QCD is NOT included in your adjusted gross income!

Here is an example. If you wish to make a \$2500 donation using money you receive from ANY source, including an RMD from your IRA/401, that money is taxable to the IRS. It must be reported as income, and depending on your tax bracket, you will pay an estimated \$375 - \$500 in income tax on the \$2500. Bottom line - to make a \$2500 donation, it will actually cost you between an estimated \$2875 - \$3000 out of pocket.

With the use of a QCD, your \$2500 donation will only costs you \$2500 and you legally avoid paying \$375-\$500 in federal income tax!

You can make a QCD to one or more tax-qualified charities each year. NOTE: The transfer must be made directly from your IRA/401K to the charity to count as a QCD. You can't just withdraw the money first and write a check to the charity. You simply contact your IRA/401K administrator and instruct them that you would like to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution for \$xxxxx to the charity of your choice, (1st Presbyterian Church of Harborcreek).

If you use a QCD to make a donation to the charity, let them know the money is coming so they can send you a confirmation of this donation, which you should keep with your tax records.

Please give strong consideration to the use of a QCD to transfer taxable RMD distributions to the church and have it become non-taxable.

P.S. When it is tax time, I can/will send anyone who makes a QCD to the church the information for reporting this non-taxable distribution on your tax filing. All of this is very simple.
