The last in-person Christmas Eve service I led was in 2019. In 2020 we were in deep COVID and I live-streamed the service from my living room. In 2021 the church I was serving, despite having resumed in-person worship, had a COVID scare and we recorded the Christmas Eve service and dropped it on YouTube. This year weather kept us from gathering. Hopefully 2023 will see us all together on December 24. And since that's a Sunday I might lead a record five services in one day – talk about making up for lost time!

But in God's economy, I don't think time is ever lost even if we must spend it in ways that are unexpected, or undesirable or unfamiliar. Not unlike the Christmas story itself in which an unexpectedly pregnant woman must make an undesirable journey and give birth in an unfamiliar place.

And maybe we're being reminded that we are not meant to "repeat the sounding joy" in exactly the same way year after year. Perhaps a lesson from the last few years is that we are all more flexible, adaptable and capable of change than we thought. A challenge for us as we enter 2023 is to balance our desire to hold fast to the familiar with God's seeming insistence that we stay alert to changing conditions and respond in faith.

I can attest that in the last couple years my own conditions have changed significantly. Mary Louise and I did not expect to find ourselves in Erie, Pennsylvania. We had an idea, a *plan*, that didn't include new winter boots. And for a while it looked like it was going to work. Until it didn't. But now, as we are settling into our new home (and I don't mean just the house), it feels almost obvious. Of course, Erie. And last month I wrote about how surprisingly quickly our roots are taking hold of this new soil. Our new patterns and rhythms are becoming familiar. There's a comfort in that, to be sure. But also a caution, for me and for our church communities.

We shouldn't get too comfortable too quickly so that we might be always ready to see the new things that God is always doing and to nimbly respond to them.

I've been reminded that in addition to this monthly newsletter article, I also have to write a message for our annual reports. I've written a lot of those over the years and they typically include a good deal of reflection on where we've been and what we've accomplished. My first one for you, though, will be far more aspirational than reflective because we're just getting started (and what an interesting start it's been!). And at least one aspiration will be to have an in-person Christmas Eve service! But I hope that our experiences over that last couple years, separately and together, have shown us that we are more resilient and adaptable that we imagined. Because God has not be wasting our time, spinning out wheels, until we can get back to "normal." I believe that God has been opening our eyes to the fact that change is what normal looks like.

I'm excited about what 2023 will hold for us, the opportunities and possibilities. I'm eager to see how God will use us – together – to participate in the "exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world." And so as our old year yields to a new one, let's pause to reflect on where we've been. But let's not linger too long in the past and instead embrace the future that God is creating...one that I hope and pray includes a Christmas Eve service!

Ash Wednesday, Wednesday, February 22, 2023



Wednesday, February 22 marks the beginning of Lent with Ash Wednesday. For Christians, Lent is a 40-day season of fasting, reflection and penance culminating in Holy Week and the Easter Sunday commemoration of Jesus' Resurrection.

Here are a few basics on the Ash Wednesday tradition:

When was the first Ash Wednesday celebrated?

Early Christians celebrated the first Ash Wednesday sometime around the Early Middle Ages, said The Rev. Arne Panula, director of the Catholic

Information Center in Washington, D.C. Monsignor Kevin Irwin, a liturgy specialist at Catholic University, said the practice started in the 10th century and became an official liturgy in the 13th century.

Is Ash Wednesday a Roman Catholic observance?

Catholics are not the only group observing Ash Wednesday. Anglicans/Episcopalians, Lutherans, United Methodists and other liturgical Protestants partake in receiving ashes. Historically, the practice has not been common among evangelicals.

Panula said Muslims, Jews and even people who are not religious can honor the tradition as a reminder of humanity's shortcomings. "People recognize that it is a symbol of our mortality," he said. "It gives us a profound sense that we are mortal, and Ash Wednesday is a reminder of that."

In a typical Ash Wednesday service, a minister recites Genesis 3:19 — "For dust you are and to dust you shall return" — while applying the ashes in the shape of a cross on the recipient's forehead.

Where do the ashes come from?

Typically, the ashes that are placed on the forehead of the individual come from branches used in the previous year's Palm Sunday services, which falls one week before Easter and commemorates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.

What do the ashes on the forehead represent?

The ashes are a profound symbolism for observers. It is a deeply ingrained tradition, even for people who may not be particularly observant. The ashes — a traditional sign of mourning and repentance — are meant to remind people that life is short.

"It is a time for Christians to carry the cross," Panula said. "The observance is a symbol of our Lord emblazoned on the forehead of Christians."



ELEVATOR UPDATE

The elevator has been out of service for several months. Some may be wondering why it is not already been repaired. The following information will bring you up to date.

The elevator was installed at the time of the addition to the church in 1995.

Like most church elevators, it has been very lightly used as compared to elevators used several times a day. It is like owning a 27 year old car with only 10,000 miles.

Our elevator was made by Inclinator Company of America.

Inclinator discontinued the production of "public use elevators" such as ours several years ago. They only produce "home" elevators.

Therefore, Inclinator no longer provides parts or service for the style elevator we have, and this has proven to be a major problem.

In late spring it was reported that the elevator could be operated with a door open - a major safety issue. It was taken out of service at that time.

A Pittsburgh based elevator service company, who has serviced our elevator previously, was called in to repair our elevator.

They were unable to repair our elevator. Their recommendation was, "Needs a new main circuit board – 14 relay 1TRB - Unable to acquire." They also say our elevator is in good condition mechanically.

A search for the above mentioned circuit card was initiated. Several calls to other service companies; online searches of elevator parts websites, both new and used: and even multiple calls with the VP – Engineering of Inclinator. Unable to locate a circuit card.

Also attempted to get a drawing and parts list of existing circuit board so could have a new one made – struck out here as well.

Last option would be to find a specialty electronics firm that might be able to troubleshoot and *repair* the existing circuit board. I FINALLY found such a firm in Baltimore, who after reviewing pictures of our board, thought they could diagnose and repair the existing circuit card if we could provide a schematic.

This repair has now been completed and the repaired circuit board has been received.


Currently working with the elevator service company to schedule their service technician back in to re-install the board and proceed to attempt to get the elevator functioning.

On a parallel path, we have had 2 sales rep visits to determine costs and options if current elevator simply cannot be repaired. One quote has already been received. Both options will require extensive changes to the current elevator opening, for which we would be responsible. 1st quote - total cost for would be \$64,000 to \$70,000.
