Greeters/Liturgists......Deacon of the Month



In my second year of seminary I served as one of four chaplain's assistants. Each of us was responsible for one of the four weekly chapel services. Each service had a different emphasis and I was assigned Friday, the Eucharist service. My responsibility was to schedule a preacher and communion celebrant, provide the liturgy, and prepare the elements and worship space. The person who preceded me in that position passed on a recipe for "non-crumbling eucharistic bread." It was not required that that bread be used but it is a pretty good recipe, so I took on the personal discipline of baking a loaf of communion bread every Thursday night. It felt good knowing that every week something I made was eaten by the seminary community; students, faculty and staff.

Through that immersive experience – planning, writing, baking, setting the table – I grew into what I think of as a Eucharistic theology. I believe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is perhaps the single most profound action we take as a worshiping community. And it's why I have long advocated for frequent and varied celebrations of the sacrament.

And I'm on firm Presbyterian ground with that. In fact, when the Directory for Worship in our Book of Order was recently revised, the old suggestion that "It is appropriate to celebrate the Lord's Supper as often as each Lord's Day" became "The Lord's Supper *shall* be celebrated as a regular part of the Service for the Lord's Day..." (W-3.0409, emphasis mine). In other words, the BOO says we should have communion every Sunday! It then goes on to say, "When local circumstances call for the Lord's Supper to be celebrated less frequently, the session may approve other schedules for celebration, in no case less than quarterly."

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In practice, very few PC(USA) churches have weekly communion. But I did serve a church that gradually increased its frequency to where we celebrated the sacrament on the first Sunday of the month, plus weekly during Advent and Lent (during mid-week special services), plus most of the times the cup symbol appears on the Presbyterian Planning calendar indicating a holy-day for which communion is appropriate (Christ the King, Christmas Eve/Day, Baptism of the Lord, Transfiguration. Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Easter Sunday, Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, World Communion Sunday, and Christ the King Sunday).

Each of those occasions offers a different perspective on the sacrament. For instance, on Ash Wednesday the bread and juice can be a powerful contrast to the ashes placing mortality and death in close proximity and tension with eternal life and resurrection.

Maundy Thursday Communion is most definitely a memorial meal remembering Christ's last supper with his friends and disciples. But on Easter it becomes a resurrection feast, a true celebration of new life.

What this variety helps us understand is that the Lord's Supper is not just one thing; it is "an abundant feast of theological meaning" (W-3.0409). There are at least seven scripturally rooted themes that describe what Christians experience in Communion:

- •It is a meal of thanksgiving ("Eucharist" means "thanksgiving"); "Jesus gave *thanks*" (Mark 14:22).
- •The Apostle Paul saw it as a sign of unity among the communicants (1 Cor. 10:16-17).
- •The Lord's Supper commemorates the historical; Jesus said, "Do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19, 1 Cor. 11:24-25). We remember the whole of Jesus's life, not only his "last supper."
- •The Roman Catholic church in particular, but also Protestants, remember Christ's obedient sacrifice as they celebrate the Eucharist (see Hebrews where Jesus is both high priest and offering).
- •We experience in Communion Christ's real presence; "The bread which I will give *is* my own flesh" (John 6:51).
- •We might see the Lord's Supper as an act of the Holy Spirit who binds us together with each other and with Christ.

•Communion is an eschatological event, a "foretaste of the heavenly banquet."

Any one of those themes offers additional avenues of understanding and practice. Presbyterians are not restricted or bound by any single theology or way of celebrating Communion, no single mood or tone. In fact, it should be incumbent upon us, through liturgy, song and movement to offer opportunities to experience the Lord's Supper in all its variety.

One of the significant ways we embody the variety of Eucharistic understandings is in how we receive the elements. For just as no one liturgy or prayer or theological doctrine can encompass the whole of the Lord's Supper, neither can one way of serving and receiving it. So sometimes we receive the elements in our seats and serve each other. This emphasizes the horizontal aspect of communion; in serving our neighbor with the words like, "This is the body of Christ broken for you," and "This is the blood of Christ shed for you," we establish deeper relationships within our covenant community (see the second theme above). The risk of being served in our seats is that communion becomes a passive event requiring no effort on the part of the communicant. And unless we actively serve our neighbor it becomes insular, no longer a real communion.

When forward we come to receive communion, while we lose the opportunity to serve our neighbor, we gain the opportunity to express our real desire for the sacrament. Leaving our seats shows that we do, in fact, accept the invitation to the table and that we are willing to come and receive the gift Christ offers. We become active participants rather than passive recipients. Coming forward also emphasizes our vertical relationship with God and Christ; as we approach the table we come closer to the place where we proclaim the real presence of Christ is found.

On Maundy Thursday we highlight the fact that the Lord's Supper is rooted in real table fellowship. When Jesus instituted the sacrament he used real food found at a real meal and did so at a real table. And by sitting around tables and serving each other we get as close as we can to experiencing the kind of sharing that was so much a part of the early church. One of the things lost by our tradition of small pieces of bread and tiny cups of juice served from specially designed trays is the sense that at the heart of Lord's Supper is a real meal.

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Two stories come to mind about profound Lord's Supper experiences. One was when I visited a man in hospice named Richard Meese. The end of his life was near and he had been suffering from dementia. For most of our visit he was only vaguely responsive. But I had my communion set with me and with his wife's permission I set out the elements and began a brief communion prayer. When I got to the Lord's Prayer, suddenly we heard Dick's voice – he was saying the prayer with surprising strength. And he was clearly attentive to the Words of Institution. Then, despite having not eaten for days, he ate a very small piece of bread and took a sip of juice. And then, as quickly as he arrived, he departed to that place where his mind and soul were resting before joining the eternal. I'd like to believe that for Dick the meal really was a foretaste of the heavenly banquet that just a day or so later surely enjoyed in the life to come.

My other story is about our wedding. Mary Louise and I had communion as part of our service and the night before I baked a loaf of non-crumbling Eucharistic bread. We were not yet ordained and so could not do the liturgy ourselves. But we were able to serve and so our first act as wife and husband (aside from kissing) was to serve our family and friends the Lord's Supper. We hope that that meal too was a kind of foretaste of a marriage grounded in the holy and blessed by those we love. It was certainly a wonderful and genuine celebration; reverent but definitely not solemn.

My hope for us as a worshiping community is that we can together explore not just the variety of the Lord's Supper – although it's a perfect place to start – but also the wide variety of worship and experience that might open us ever more fully to our God of limitless possibility.




